California has **3.9 million** Small Businesses, taking up to 99.8% of all businesses.




**7 million** employees are working for small businesses, which is 48.8% of all employees in California.


# ORANGE COUNTY PROFILE



Orange County, CA is a region located in southern California. Mostly known for the city of Anaheim where Disneyland and Knott's Berry Farm theme parks are located. Orange County has multiple beach resorts that include Laguna Beach, Newport Beach, etc.

Nationwide and Statewide Orange County has multiple cities that rank with some of the highest population nationwide.

More importantly, the OC is a hub for startups and established business. The region offers many opportunities offering a great alternative to the famous Silicon Valley for all businesses. The OC has a lot to offer with its 3.2 million residents, 1.6 million employees, low unemployment rate of 2.6%, high education, and robust economy.




## Economic Overview

Orange County has 114,845 total business (EDD 2016). According to United States Employment Development Department, 114,625 businesses are with 0-500 employees in Orange County, which are categorized as small businesses. Only 220 businesses are big companies with more than 500 employees. Small businesses are accounting for more than 1,409,782 employees. In total, Orange County has the highest ratio of 4.17% population vs businesses among OC/IE area, leaving a great amount of growth for the OC business development sector.






# DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE



# **EMPLOYMENT**

Between May 2017 and May 2018, total nonfarm employment increased by 17,300 jobs. This number comes from a gain of 23,500 new jobs, and 6,200 jobs lost.






Unemployment Rate





# Top 10 City with highest number of businesses





From latest data that Bureau of Census collected in 2012, demographics of business owners can be informative, and also indicating for small businesses.

Total business ownership data shows that in Orange County, there are more men-owned business than women-owned, but more minority owned businesses than nonminority. Veteran owned business are only 7%, compared with nonveteran owned business.

Riverside County is among the fastest growing regions in the state; that is mainly due to the economic advantages that arise in the county.




# Economic Overview



Riverside has 59,807 total business (EDD 2016). According to United States Employment Development Department, 59,705 businesses have between 0-499 employees in Riverside County (EDD). In payroll, all the businesses make up \$7,497,373 million for the region; accounting for a total of 688,722 employees of California. In total, Riverside County has 2.65% population vs businesses, leaving a great amount of growth for the Riverside business development sector (ESRI).






#### Population by Age



The County of San Bernardino is a region located in southern California. It is included within the Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario metropolitan statistical area, also known as the Inland Empire.

The County of San Bernardino boasts an area of 20,105 square miles making it the largest county in the United States by area. This county spans from the south of the San Bernardino Mountains, to the Nevada border, and the Colorado River.

San Bernardino County has a total population of 2,139,570 people, 900,000 Employees, an unemployment rate of 3.6%, and a diverse economy.





#### Population by Age




In terms of absolute growth, all age groups in San Bernardino County are projected to increase from the year 2017 to 2045. The statewide increase in the senior population is projected to be 107% over the same period, with relative growth from 11% of the population in 2017 to 19% by 2045. Adults ages 25-44 enjoy a slight relative increase from 26% to 27% of the total population. All other age groups are projected to shrink in various degrees relative to the total population.






